Buddy Programme

The Hutt Valley Angling Club offers to its members the opportunity to be part of the Buddy Programme. The idea of this scheme is to assist newer members with on water tuition.

Participants need to be relatively competent in casting prior to going on the water. The Buddy Programme is the next step after members have been to a number of Casting Clinics.

Those persons who organise and run the Casting Clinics at the Belmont Domain will have an understanding on the capabilities and progression of members and will be in a position to advise if a member is ready to go out on the water with a more experienced club member.

It is anticipated that at the casting clinic the organiser will suggest to the member that they have progressed to a level where they could go on the Buddy Programme. The person will then contact the Buddy Programme organiser and they will then be put in contact with an experienced club member and go out on the water with.

It is anticipated that the on the water tuition will take place on the Hutt River when it suits both parties.

Interclub Fly Tying Competition Report

On Monday 9 October the Hutt Valley Angling Club hosted the annual Interclub Fly Tying Competition at the King Lion Hall. Teams from The Wellington Flyfishers Club and the Kapiti Fly Fishing Club joined with HVAC for this three-way competition.

Representing Wellington were Strato Cotsilinis, Paul Baker, Gordon Baker and club judge, Linda Brown. Representing Kapiti were Craig Gutry, Michael Murphy, Tony Jacques and club judge, Malcolm Francis. Representing Hutt Valley were Ajit Jogi, Thomas Fichtner, John Millar and club judge, Graham Odlum.

Within the one hour competition, each team was required to tie and submit a total of 8 flies including the 3 compulsory flies; a dry fly (Twilight Beauty size 12), a nymph (Pheasant Tail halfback, size 14) and a lure (Craig's Nighttime, size 8). Tyers were also given free rein to tie a fly of their own choice. Flies were judged blind by each of the 3 club judges, each with a 20% weighting, and by the head judge Tony Houpt, with a 40% weighting.

After an intense hour of tying, time was up and it was time to collate the scores from each of the judges. Taking out individual honours for the best fly of the evening was Michael Murphy from the Kapiti club. Taking out overall honours, and the Interclub Trophy was the Hutt Valley Angling Club (580 points), followed in second place by the Kapiti Fly Fishing Club (562 points) and the Wellington Flyfishers Club (550 points).

Thanks must go to everyone who helped make the competition a success. Special thanks to head judge Tony Houpt, all of the competitors and judges, all of the supporters from each of the clubs and those who worked tirelessly in the background organising the event, setting up the hall, preparing supper and cleaning up afterwards.

So the Interclub Fly Tying Trophy remains in the HVAC cabinet for the next 12 months after which time it will be contested once again . It is very heartening to see that fly tying is in a healthy state, helped along by competitions such as this.





Trout Talk Big Jack

This month I had intended to write about the first Waterstrider raft trip of the new season but the Labour weekend weather in Taihape thwarted the plans of Ross Goodman & I.

Instead, I'll talk about a problem that many of you have likely experienced to one degree or another. I was talking to an angler recently who we shall call Bert. He had noticed a most unpleasant odour (notes of cat pee I think he said!) emanating from his garage. Turns out all the bacteria that had infested Bert's waders and he had not cleaned out had

come back to haunt him. I recall times when, on the last day (or not even the last day) of a multi-day trip, I bent down to release a fish and found that the crouching position had also released a smell I was sure was not of my making from my waders (but was!). So, the advice this month is to give the waders a good wash after you've worn them for a few days. A quick sniff test will tell you whether they need washing. My method is to put enough warm water in the bath to submerge the waders and mix in thoroughly about half a cup of washing machine powder. Wipe off any outside dirt etc. and then turn the waders inside out and submerge them in the bath. Leave them overnight then rinse them well with cold water. You'll likely be surprised at the colour of the water! Then hang them upside down so they drain, still inside out in a cool spot - not direct sunlight. Once the inside has dried turn them right way out and hang them up again until they are thoroughly dry. This may not be the prescribed method of washing but it hasn't done my Simms Freestone's any harm and I've had them for over 6 years.

Mexican Style Trout

Preparation time: 15 minutes, Cooking time: 40 minutes,

Oven: Preheat to 180°C (350°F, gas mark 4),

Calories per serving: 425



2 large 1 1/2 lb (700 g) or 4 small gutted trout 1 large onion 1 red pepper 2 tablespoons olive oil 1 dessertspoon sherry or white wine vinegar Juice of 2 limes 3 tablespoons fresh chopped parsley 2 dashes tabasco sauce Salt and freshly ground black pepper

Avocado Dip
1 ripe avocado
1 tablasanan natural yan

1 tablespoon natural yoghurt

Preparation

1. Peel and thinly slice the onion. Halve, de-seed and dice the pepper. Heat the oil in a frying pan, add the onion and vinegar and cook over a moderate heat for 5 minutes.

- 2. Add the pepper and cook for a further 2 minutes. Then add the juice of one of the limes, 2 tablespoons of the parsley, and the tabasco. Mix thoroughly and remove from the heat.
- 3. Brush an ovenproof dish with a little oil, place the trout in the dish and season lightly. Spoon over the onion and pepper mixture. Tighty cover the dish with foil and bake in the oven for about 30 minutes.
- 4. Meanwhile, halve the avocado and remove the stone, then peel away the skin. Blend the avocado, the juice of the second lime, and the yoghurt together in a liquidiser or mash them together with a fork.
- 5. The dip can be gently heated before serving but should not be kept warm for too long.
- 6. Garnish the baked trout and the dip with the remaining parsley. Serve the dip with the fish or in a separate bowl.
