Bushy dry flies are easy to see and should float well when attached to a nymph rig. They also work well in riffly water or drifted along an overhung or grassy bank. In these situations when fished alone as a dry fly they can be more successful at tempting trout that may not come to a smaller artificial.

Hutt River Masterclass Report

On Saturday 16 September, John Gummer and Tarn Mack-McEwen ran a practical workshop to show how they would approach and fish the Hutt River for the first time.



John outlined the programme for the day and described the various methods and equipment that he and Tarn would be demonstrating



The first method discussed was Euro or short line nymphing. John explained that in the right type of water, especially where fast and slow seams meet, this is probably the most effective technique because it allows the flies to sink quickly to the bottom where the current is slower and then move very naturally, largely unaffected by surface drag. John used a 10ft 2 weight rod with 000 weight fly line with about a rod length of straight leader then a short section of bi-colour mono for an indicator followed by about 7 ft of tippet. The heaviest fly was placed on the point, with a lighter fly on a dropper.



John set up the Euro rig, explaining some of the finer technical details as he went.



Tarn then demonstrated the technique. Note that he is searching the quiet water close to the bank before moving out to the seam where fast water meets slow.



The seam between fast and slow water is very obvious in this shot. By using a quick flicking action, Tarn was able to lob his flies a surprising distance and still have control over them.

John then demonstrated swinging wet flies on a skagit line. With this very heavy tip, he was able to load the rod easily and achieve amazing distance with a seemingly effortless spey cast.



Spey casting is effective in both fresh water and salt water. Here, John shows a selection of some of his salt water flies.



After lunch, members were given the opportunity to try out some of the spey casting gear that John and Tarn had brought along. Even very experienced anglers found some of these new techniques interesting and fun.



For the afternoon session, members were given the chance to try out some of the spey casting techniques. Here, Ian is using a single- handed 7 weight rod with a commando skagit tip and achieving impressive distance.

At the conclusion of the day, we met back at the Belmont Domain carpark, where John and Tarn were thanked for sharing their valuable knowledge so clearly. Thanks also went to Ross Goodman for initiating and organising the event. Judging by the positive comments heard from new and experienced members alike, the day was a resounding success.

Trout with Garlic Lemon Butter Herb Sauce

Trout with Garlic Lemon Butter Herb Sauce – simple and delicious way to cook fish, especially if you're in a hurry! The whole recipe takes only 30 minutes. Italian herb seasoning, chopped fresh parsley and garlic give great flavour to the fish!



1.5 pounds trout (or salmon, or arctic char) - 2 large fish fillets with skin on the bottom

- 2 tablespoons olive oil (more, if needed)
- 1 tablespoon Italian herb seasoning (dried thyme, oregano, parsley,

combined)

salt, to taste

- 4 garlic cloves, diced
- 3 tablespoons lemon juice, freshly squeezed
- 2 more tablespoons white wine
- 2 tablespoons butter, softened
- 2 tablespoons parsley, chopped

Preparation

Season the top of fish fillets with Italian herb seasoning and salt (generously). Fish fillets will have skins on the bottom - no need to season the skins.

In a large skillet (large enough to fit 2 fish fillets), heat 2 tablespoons of olive oil on medium heat until heated but not smoking. To the hot skillet with olive oil, add fish fillets skin side up - flesh side down. Cook the flesh side of the fish for about 3-5 minutes on medium heat, making sure the oil does not smoke, until lightly browned. Flip the fillets over to the other side, skin side down (add more oil, if needed). Cook for another 2-4 minutes on medium heat (to prevent oil from burning). Remove the skillet from heat, close with the lid, and let the fish sit for 5-10 minutes, covered, in the skillet, until flaky and cooked through completely.

After the fish is cooked through, off heat, using spatula, carefully remove fillets to the plate, separating the fish from the skin. Carefully remove or scrape the fish skin off the bottom of the pan, making sure to leave all the cooking oils in the pan.

Add diced garlic, lemon juice, and white wine to the same pan with oil. Cook on medium-low heat for about 1 minute, until garlic softens a bit. Remove from heat. Add 1 tablespoon of chopped parsley, and 2 tablespoons of butter, off heat, to the sauce, stirring, until the butter melts and forms a creamy mixture.

Add fish to the pan, spoon sauce over the fish, top the fish and sauce with the remaining 1 tablespoon of parsley, and serve.
