## Fly Fishing Jargon

The jargon commonly used by fishermen and tackle dealers can seem like a different language to beginners. We have given definitions to some of these terms and hope this helps them to gain a better understanding when listening to more experienced anglers speaking about their obsession.

| Word or Expression | Brief Definition or Explanation                            |
|--------------------|--|
| Beat               | Path taken by a cruising fish                              |
| Bomb               | Heavy nymph used as a sinker to fish deep water            |
| Bulging            | Feeding on Emergers just under the surface                 |
| CDC                | Cul de Canard. Soft, oily feather from rump of a duck      |
| Cruiser            | Trout swimming and feeding in slow water                   |
| Dead Drift         | Natural presentation of a fly without drag                 |
| Drag               | Unnatural fly movement caused by current action on line    |
| Drop-off           | Point at the head of pool where depth increases suddenly   |
| Dropped (a fish)   | Hooked, but then lost a fish before landing it.            |
| Dropper            | A secondary line attached to the main line                 |
| Dry Fly            | A fly that floats when fished properly                     |
| Emerger            | Stage in development between nymph and flying insect       |
| Furled Leader      | Leader of tapered construction made by twisting monofil    |
| Larva (e)          | Subsurface stage of some aquatic insects e.g. Caddis       |
| Leader             | The nylon or copolymer section between fly line and flies. |
| Limit              | Regulation daily bag limit for a river or lake             |
| Lure               | Large wet fly, also a spinning lure                        |
| Mend               | Reposition the fly line on the water to minimise drag.     |
| Nymph              | Subsurface stage of aquatic insect. See Larva              |
| Nymphing           | Trout feeding on nymphs. Angler using nymph artificial.    |

| Word or Expression   | Brief Definition or Explanation                                  |
|----------------------|--|
| Otolith              | Bone from inside the ear of a fish. Used for research.           |
| Paradise Duck (pair) | Fisherman's curse  |
| Picked up (fish)     | Hooked and landed a fish.  |
| Riffle               | Shallow broken water between pools                               |
| Rig                  | Terminal tackle, including trace or leader. A small shark.       |
| Run                  | Relatively fast, deep water between pools                        |
| Strip                | Retrieve line quickly by hand without using the reel             |
| Tippet               | Fine end of leader attached to fly.                              |
| Truck and Trailer    | Inline method of tying tippet and 2nd fly to bend of (fly) hook. |
| Wet Fly              | Fly which will sink below the surface when fished correctly.     |
